in the savings? Would this require a designated line item in the budget to reflect a transfer from the savings funds. What is the wisdom in maintaining the savings funds? Kurt Sollenberger: Expression of support for the idea of reviewing our true membership numbers and defining the membership records. Jeff Eisenbise: The issue of the membership count assessment misses the point of the motion. The point of the savings account is that the funds accrue interest and then we spend the interest earnings. The motion appears to be change to how we approach the savings funds by spending the principal. Debbie Sagar: Question regarding the ministry benefits and salary in relation to hiring a music ministry person. Ken Kraybill: Is there some mechanism from a parliamentary procedure standpoint to table this motion? I find it impossible to make a reasonable decision in this setting. Can we table this for the next council meeting? These issues need to be settled in advance for an amendment of this nature. What are the appropriate procedures for this type of action? One way to handle this would be for a vote to be "no" for now and bring it up at another time. Another way is to amend the motion to refer it to a task force to present a recommendation at the next council meeting. Ray Leckrone: I would prefer to have this motion defeated than to be tabled.\ Anna Belser: I find over the years as a member of this congregation that we are slow to make such changes or conservative in our approach. I would like to see more done in favor of the motion. I'm hearing that most of us would like to think about it and have it brought up again. Action: Jeff Eisenbise moved to refer this matter to a special task force to present a recommendation to the spring council meeting as to what we do with our special investment funds. Motion seconded by John Over. Jim Hollinger: As chair of the witness commission, thanks to Ray for bringing this matter to our attention. In support of recommending this to a special study committee to give this more attention. John David Bowman: Would this task force also be looking at the issues presented? The most significant event on the horizon is our staffing reorganization. There is a correlation of a congregation of a critical mass and what is can support in forms of staff. X. **Update on Music & Worship Search Committee** Jim Hollinger Committee has identified two positions: Organist/Keyboardist and Music Coordinator. Meeting upcoming on Tuesday that should further us in identifying candidates for these positions. Things are moving along. XI. **Update on Building Project & Financials** (Exhibit F) Jim Hoffer I would like to provide some updates to the written report in your Council Packet. While the ceilings are opened up and the infrastructure is exposed, materials are being added to provide a degree of soundproofing to the offices. This should enhance the productivity of the workspace. There is a lot of activity and noise in this building during the week. The open ceilings also allow the installation of approximately 500 feet of 2-inch innerduct for future use. There are some future applications under consideration. We don't want to come back in the future and play with the drop-in ceiling panels or have to cut holes in either newly plastered or drywalled ceilings. The project budget can absorb these additional costs. The written report refers to issues with PP&L. It seems that January has now moved to February. Neither the contractors or church representatives seem able to move PP&L. PP&L moves at their schedule. So yes, we will have costs for the contractors to remobilize due to PP&L's delay. As we have moved further into the current project phase, the supply side of some materials has become a challenge and in turn, has added two to three weeks time to the Project. We now anticipate substantial completion, clean-up, and available use of the 1st-floor areas by mid-December. Other than the PP&L issue, we anticipate substantial completion of the project by mid-January. The written report refers to the professionalism and experience of the construction firms and their personnel on this job. The Church Building Committee meets weekly with the various contractors' representatives to be sure work is coordinated, schedules are reviewed and adhered to, and hiccups along the way are addressed. To a person, all involved are cooperative and exhibit an attitude of working together to get the job done and problems addressed. We are fortunate. Additionally, Barry Garman, Chair of the Building Committee and who also serves as the owner's representative on the project, is here in the building most days addressing questions and issues as they occur. A Big Thanks to Barry! Thank you for your patience, flexibility, understanding, and financial support. The Building Committee continues to believe the project will be completed within the approved budget. ELIZABETHTOWN CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN MINUTES OF SPECIAL CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING SUNDAY, APRIL 16, 2023

Acting Moderator, Carroll Kreider, welcomed all in attendance at 11:35 a.m. Carroll introduced Pete Kontra, District Executive, as the Atlantic Northeast District Church of the Brethren representative for the official calling of a pastor. Pete offered opening remarks and a prayer.

Carroll specified the reason for this special council meeting which is to consider two motions: 1) to call Naomi Kraenbring to full-time pastoral ministry at the Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren and 2) to approve the financial compensation package for Naomi upon the result of the first motion. Jeff Eisenbise, Church Board Chair, offered his remarks and then invited Naomi to further address the meeting regarding her discernment during the past year as our interim pastor.

On behalf of the Church Board, Jeff conveyed some additional information for the first motion. Following time for discussion, comments and questions on motion 1, Jeff spoke on behalf of the Church Board regarding motion 2, the compensation package and allowed time for any discussion or questions on this motion.

Carroll then called for the ballots to be marked and collected for counting. After a short amount of time to allow for the counting of the paper ballots and those voting on-line, Pete Kontra announced the results: Motion 1, affirm calling Naomi Kraenbring to full-time pastoral ministry at Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren, the result was 100% YES (125 votes). On motion 2, affirm the financial package for Naomi Kraenbring, the result was 98.4% YES (or 123 votes).

After a few parting words from Carroll and Naomi, Bless Be the Tie that Binds was sung and the meeting was adjourned at 12:05 p.m.

As pastoral staff, we value your continued support and encouragement as we all continue the work of Jesus peacefully, simply, together.

Church Board Chair Report

In addition to the continuing work of each commission, a primary focus of the board in the next quarter of this year will be on discerning and delivering appropriate staffing resources to supplement the work of Pastors Naomi and Jason.

With the retirement of Pastor Pam, the obvious hole to fill is congregational care and visitation. In the immediate near term, the Leadership Team has implemented a plan whereby Pastor Jason will serve as the point person or coordinator for addressing congregational care needs as they arise. A combination of caregivers; pastors, deacons and some designated lay visitors, will assume responsibility for meeting those needs.

Because pastoral visitation and care ebbs and flows, we will have to monitor how well this near term care model meets our requirements. We may discover a need to hire part-time interim help in this area until it is clear what our long-term staffing model looks like.

Identifying an effective, efficient long term staffing alignment is critical to determining the trajectory of our congregational life. To that end, the Leadership Team is developing a holistic process designed to provide the board with information necessary to make some critical decisions.

Rhonda Myers has been asked to serve as the primary facilitator of a Needs Assessment Process whose ultimate goal is to convert the aspirations expressed in last fall's listening sessions and the January Board retreat into program objectives that the congregation wants to support.

The Samaritan Counseling Group, an agency with whom we have long been affiliated, has tools and resources designed specifically to assist congregations and pastors with this very process and Rhonda is in the process of researching their efficacy.

The Leadership Team expects to work with her to develop a process whereby the board is able to consider the gifts and time constraints of the present pastoral team and determine what additional resources should be applied so that the needs and aspirations of the congregation become program objectives.

Rhonda has been asked to go one step further and consider how we might best develop an assessment model for helping both the board and the pastors to hold each other accountable. The board needs to be accountable for understanding and articulating the aspirations and needs of the congregation and translating them into program objectives. In collaboration with the pastors, these objectives should be baked into the job descriptions of the staff.

The assessment model would then provide an ongoing mechanism for considering whether expectations and actions are mutually beneficial. This is an effort to improve on the not particularly helpful job performance reviews that have been intermittently used, misused or ignored for most of our institutional existence.

Sunday Morning Faith Formation

The building renovation project has progressed in the last six months to the point that we have been able to move back into all of our classrooms! This has made a tremendous difference in our ability to provide needed spaces for Faith Formation groups during the first hour on Sundays, as well as meeting spaces during the week. The Nursery has moved back into its room, conveniently located next to the sanctuary. The youth (Jr & Sr High) have been enthusiastic about decorating their space as they wish. Blaze (K – 5th) once again has their own colorful room and storage complete with new child-size stackable chairs. Shine (2 – 5 yrs) continues to share a classroom with the Nursery School in the lower level. The adult Discovery class is back in its classroom, which also serves as an efficient meeting space for larger groups. And we now even have spaces for 2 new adult Faith Formation groups.

Jr/Sr High

Youth Inquirers Class ran for 8 weeks in February and March and was led primarily by Pastor Jason with help from Pastors Pam and Naomi. This was an opportunity for all Junior and Senior High youth to learn the history of our church and denomination, explore their faith and what it means to make the decision to follow Jesus. It was good to be able to offer this program, the first since COVID. Four youth chose to be baptized on Palm Sunday: Sarah Heinz, Moriah Kraenbring, Ryan Siler, and Ben Siler. We welcome them into our fold.

Adult Faith Formation

The Discovery class invited Christine Bucher and John David Bowman to present and discuss "Processing Our Faith in the 21st Century: A Gentle Introduction of Process Theology" during the month of February. It was very well attended. We publicized the topic in the local paper which helped draw in a few attendees from the community. This class continues to have the ability to meet as a hybrid class. Both participants that can join in-person and on-line are welcome.

This spring we began offering two new adult Faith Formation opportunities in addition to the Discovery Class lecture series. "Chalkboard Chat" is an informal discussion format prompted by questions written on the chalkboard each Sunday morning. "Bible Exploration", led by David Leiter, is a class that dives into scripture and the historical context in which it was written.

Vacation Bible School will be held at our church from August 15 – 18, 2023. It takes many volunteers to run a successful program, so anyone interested in helping should please contact either Pastor Jason or Lynne Hockley. The Shine curriculum will be "Changemaker's Lab" based on Mark 1:15 "Now is the time! Here comes God's kingdom! Change your hearts and lives, and trust in this good news!"

Future Goals

- 1. Increase our support of students that have special needs (one-on-one support)
- 2. Hold a training for Faith Formation teachers sometime before the school year starts
- 3. Review and update the Christian Ed Commission's Handbook
- 4. Continue to brainstorm ways we can encourage the attendance of children and youth during the Faith formation hour

We are always pursuing volunteers to help in our children's programs. We'd like more substitute teachers for Blaze and Shine, baby holders in the nursery, and Kid's Club leaders during the church hour. Those who work with children in our church are required to have updated child abuse background checks which are easy to acquire online through Pastor Jason.

Nurture Commission Report

The Nurture Commission continues actively to promote experiences that nurture friendships and relationships within the church community as well as to enable persons of all ages to develop their faith through small group activities.

Among the activities Nurture supports are events, small groups, and programs such as Faith Markers. This Spring, Nurture also provided the Lenten Discussion Forum. Integral to Nurture is the support of small groups such as the TransParent support group and others, following up on the congregational interest survey. Future groups may be focused on young adults or created based on the interest in specific books by Pavlovitz or Rohr. Nurture is planning a church weekend jointly with the Witness Commission and bringing speaker and author John Pavlovitz to the church and community in October.

Led by Gina Strouse and Deb Ziegler, Nurture's subcommittee on senior ministry, called "Prime Time," plans trips and tours such as Barnstormers and Rock Ford as well as luncheon speakers, walking and hiking opportunities, and a session of intergenerational storytelling, perhaps jointly done with the Racial Justice group. Discussion is also going on about expanding our horizons by visiting with other faiths and about deepening our church relationships through mentoring circles. A full schedule of Prime Time events for the 2023-24 year will be made available.

Resources Commission Report

Besides managing the day to day building needs and operation, the Resources Commission continues to fill in the gaps to complete other necessary work as the HVAC project wraps up.

- We have completed painting and flooring work in multiple areas as the old heating system was removed. These include the narthex and portico entrance area, pastors' offices, the narthex bathrooms, the nursery, the main office and supply room, the parlor, the quilt room, the choir room and adjacent hallway, and several daycare class rooms.
- Painting and plaster work is complete in the men's bathroom by the kitchen
 and the elevator room on the FH level. New fixtures will be installed in the
 bathroom after we do flooring. Flooring upgrades have been planned to
 replace the old vinyl in those areas, the stairway landings, and the hallway by
 the choir room.
- Plaster repair and painting is scheduled for all the stairwells.
- We have purchased a new stove and (used) convection ovens for the kitchen. The big closet by the kitchen has been purged of unnecessary items and reorganized with new shelving. Barry Garman is turning the stage into a storage area, which will alleviate some of our storage needs since all tables and chairs will be stored there, along with select other items. Plans are in the works for a kitchen and fellowship hall upgrade. This project will be dependent on having additional funds approved.
- In April we had a successful work day, where we pruned, planted some shrubs and grass, and mulched the church grounds.
- We have removed the old volleyball poles and basketball hoop and installed a new (donated) hoop in the parking lot.

Resources would like to thank Amy Zimmerman, our Facilities Manager, for all the various things she does on a daily basis, and Crystal and Brooke in the office for keeping us organized and in the loop with anything else that needs attention. There are so many little things that happen daily to keep the church running smoothly, and they all do a great job! Thanks to Barry Garman and the building committee. Our projects often intersect and overlap, so their cooperation and coordination is always appreciated. Also, my fellow Resources members Duane Hernley, Don Ziegler, and Doug Good, who all spend a lot of time and their own resources to make things happen. It's a great "hands-on" group, and I feel fortunate to have them on the team. Thanks to Pastor Pam and Jeff Eisenbise for their guidance and sometimes different perspectives. Lastly, thanks to the congregation for your continued support as we do our work. There is still so much to do, as we held off doing any type of renovations for years due to the anticipated building project that took a different turn. The progress has been slow, but we are gradually getting to the point where we are seeing some real changes.

So far this year we have organized "Service Sunday", on Feb 19. At this service we had SERRV and Equal Exchange products for sale, sent 39 letters to prisoners on Death Row in Oklahoma, packaged 100 "to go" bags for the clients at ECHOS, wrote a dozen cards for residents of Brethren Village in Lititz, picked up trash around the church, had an opportunity for education and conversation about Brownville, near the border, and enjoyed a fellowship luncheon together.

We met with Gail Viscome, representing "Elizabethtown Area Communities that Care". She shared with us ways that we can support our local students and become involved with the local community and you will probably be hearing more about this initiative.

The Climate Crisis Action Committee hosted a movie about climate change, and also had a booth at Earth Day. They are also working with the Resources Commission to work toward a greener footprint.

In April, we organized a Chicken Barbeque to benefit the Haiti Medical Center and CCEPI in Nigeria. We raised over \$13,000 for that.

Two big projects that we are working on now are working with Nurture to bring John Pavlovitz to our church for a weekend in October and sponsoring a refugee family. Both of these projects need a lot of volunteer support and we will be asking for that. If you feel a calling to work more in Witness, we have an opening on our commission for the remainder of this year.
